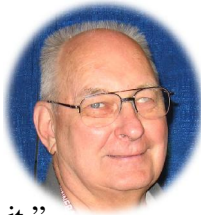

**LOW SODIUM PASTA ITALIANO**

- 1 pound small-shell pasta
- 1 1/2 pounds Italian sausage, mild or hot
- 1 large green bell pepper, seeded and chopped
- 1 pound sliced mushrooms
- 3 (14.5 ounces) cans diced tomatoes with basil, garlic and oregano (Note: I need only one large can.)

Prepare pasta according to package directions. Meanwhile, in large lightly oiled skillet over medium-high heat, saute sausage, breaking it up. When sausage is almost done, add pepper and saute for 3 minutes. Add mushrooms and cook another 2 to 3 minutes, or until almost softened. Add tomatoes, bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Toss mixture with pasta and serve.

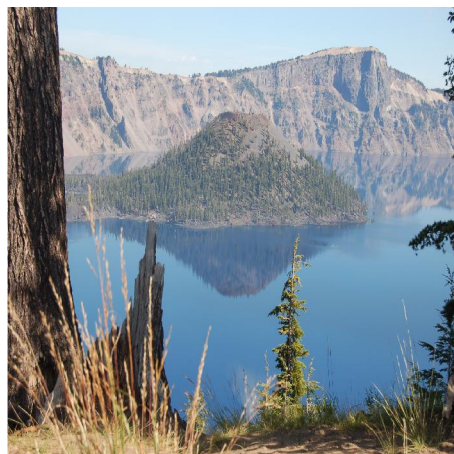
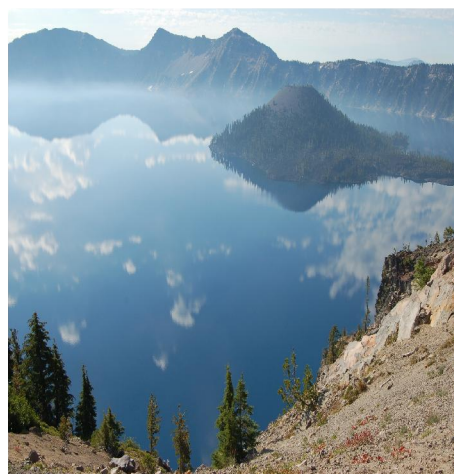
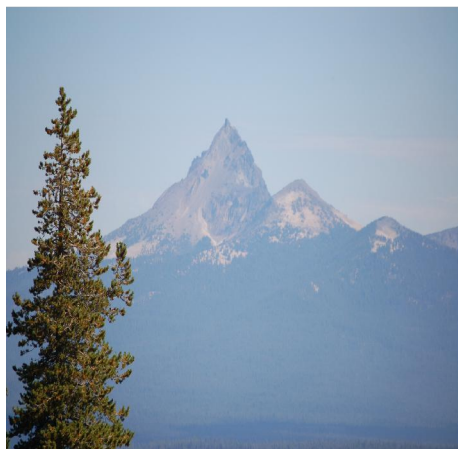
